The Eagle Watchers was written by biologists who study and conserve eagles in the wild to share their stories of these magnificent, yet often misunderstood, creatures up close and personal. In a book featuring glorious color photographs of eagles, 29 researchers share their stories of studying 24 species of eagles on six continents. Tales include being stalked by grizzly bears, followed by secret police, firing mortar rounds over a school gymnasium, tracking eagles via satellite, being the guest of honor at a circumcision ceremony, sharing an aquatic car with the Khmer Rouge, and being press ganged into a frenzied tribal death march through the jungle. The eagles featured range from the common (African fish eagle, bald eagle, and golden eagle) to two of the world's rarest species (Philippine eagle and Madagascar fish eagle).

Royalties from this book will be donated to **Hawk Mountain Sanctuary** (USA) and the **National Birds of Prey Trust** (UK). The book's authors, editors and photographers have contributed their time and stories to support these causes.

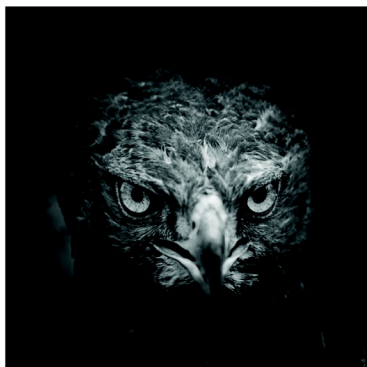
